

# HIV/AIDS Survey Indicators Database

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## Program Areas and Indicators

The HIV/AIDS Survey Indicators Database offers an internationally-accepted, consistent method for measuring factors related to HIV prevention across countries, such as prevention and treatment spending and policies, knowledge and availability of methods of prevention, and attitudes towards people with HIV.

The indicators used in this database were drawn from guides from UNAIDS, the UN General Assembly Special Session on HIV/AIDS (UNGASS), the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), and the Global Fund to Fight HIV/AIDS, Malaria and Tuberculosis.
